Members can choose one or both services, but fees apply, and members must send an email acknowledgement that they have read, understood, and agreed to our written AI Policy before Law Library staff can use our AI tools for them.

BOOK DISCUSSION





TECH CORNER: DATA CENTERS



As demand for modern data centers grows, real estate in cities like Brook Park is being rapidly acquired. AI, machine learning, and cloud-based systems require vast amounts of data, and more data means more data centers.

While data centers are not new, they are more essential than ever. These facilities house critical applications and data, often containing complex storage systems, servers, routers, and firewalls. They require enormous power and water to keep equipment cool. Architecturally, they must be accessible to staff but private enough to avoid disrupting the surrounding environment. Ideal sites are geographically stable, scalable, and flexible. Of course, prime locations like <u>Hannibal</u>, <u>Ohio</u> immediately jump to one's mind. Despite these needs, many centers are built in less-than-

ideal locations like water-scarce Arizona and Texas. Environmental concerns are mounting. A 2024 **University of Wisconsin-Madison** article claims a single AI chatbot query uses as much energy as leaving a light bulb on for 20 minutes. The same paper predicts that by 2026, AI could consume 6% of U.S. electricity. In October, Amazon Web Services experienced a major outage in North Virginia due to a bug triggered by two systems simultaneously automating the same data. Some see this as a warning about overreliance on these few but powerful systems while others argue it proves the need for more infrastructure. The I-X Center is reportedly becoming a new AWS facility as part of Amazon's \$7.8 billion Ohio investment. There should be no shortage of water, and visitors will be able to easily find it located right next to the airport and new Brook Park Browns domed stadium. The impacts it can have on a community are profound which is likely why the Norton City Council rejected the proposal to build one near Limestone Drive.


